No. 1: Gary Danko

Food: 29 Decor: 27 Service: 29 Cost: \$110

It's "tough enough to get to No. 1 and even harder to stay there", but Gary Danko (the man and his "truly American classic" on the Wharf) "remains the reigning and undefeated champ" for Food, Service and Popularity in the Bay Area Survey, offering "the epitome of white-tablecloth fine dining" without the "stuckup feeling" via "exceptional", "flexible prix fixe" options and "marvelous" "custom pairings" of wine (plus an "astounding" cheese cart); it's all delivered in a "gorgeous"

"jewelbox" setting by a "most gracious" staff that "treats everyone like a millionaire", and naturally, it comes "at a price", but it's widely considered a "relative bargain" compared to other "temples of gastronomy." 800 N. Point St.; 415-749-2060

No. 2: French Laundry

Food: 29 Decor: 27 Service: 28 Cost: \$297

"Words can't even describe" the "experience of a lifetime" say food lovers who've had the "thrill" of landing a reservation and making "the trek" to Thomas Keller's "culinary Everest" in Yountville where the "heavenly" New American—French tasting menus "feature ingredients treated with the utmost respect and care" and the "impeccable" service is "like a coordinated dance"; it's all "too precious" for some and wines cost "a fortune", but acolytes insist "you'll go to your grave (in a pauper's field) remembering this meal" and the "exquisite" "gardens outside the stone building." 6640 Washington St., Yountville; 707-944-2380

No. 3: Kiss Seafood

For the real thing" without the airfare, foodies trek to this "secret sushi spot" in Japantown where "divinely executed sushi" ("any fresher and you'd be eating underwater") and "amazingly authentic" omakase dinners are served in "living room"—sized digs; with only "12 seats" overseen by "the chef and his wife", it feels like an "honor to eat here" for guests who gush it's "well worth the money and the effort" and "virtually impossible not to leave happy." 1700 Laguna St.; 415-474-2866

"Creative" farm-to-table cuisine inspired by Rome (a seven-hilled city like SF) includes "amazing" "housemade giant raviolis" at this "darling", "intimate" Nob Hill trattoria that also offers an "interesting" selection of "well-priced" wines chosen by "two master sommeliers"; "the caliber of cooking is comparable to more expensive places", plus a "lively" noise level and "welcoming" servers help create a "friendly" atmosphere.

When you're "in the most romantic of moods", this Polk Gulch "old-world" "shrine" "to haute cuisine à la Italia" is "superlative in every sense", from the "superior" wine list to the "very current" Italian prix fixe menus that are "perfection on a plate"; "well-dressed" patrons populate the "elegant", "hushed" setting in a former chapel, where "gracious" servers "anticipate" your "every need" ("the ballet should be

this well choreographed"); and if it's undoubtedly "expensive", "who could put a price" on such an "exquisite" experience?

"Anyone visiting Yosemite" "must" stop by this Oakhurst "special- occasion" spot for a "taste of Europe in the Sierras" by way of the "fantastic" New French—Californian prix fixes often proffered by the "charming" "Erna herself" in an "elegant" "fairytale" setting; it's "very expensive", but "nothing compares" for miles around, and if you stay overnight at the "adjacent château", Sunday brunch is "exquisite" too. No. 7: Marinus

Way beyond the typical "hotel restaurant", this Carmel Valley "gem" at Bernardus Lodge boasts a "beautiful" setting and "inviting" revamped decor as a backdrop for Cal Stamenov's "impeccable" Cal—New French menus that "push the envelope" while pleasing vegetarians, localavores and omnivores alike; service is "top-of-the-line" and the wine list is "staggering" (with "prices to match"), so overall it's "well worth the trip for a special occasion" and even better to "stay the night so you can savor every glass." No. 8: Kokkari Estiatorio

"Don't Ask Don't Tell" was a United States policy that ended in September of 2011. While instated and even after, it has had negative effects on homosexuals serving in the military. Mental health care workers need to understand how this policy has affected both those serving as well as their families. This presentation will explore the effects of DADT from several viewpoints. Service members' stories will be shared through a photojournalism project of photos and oral interviews with service members affected by the military's ban on homosexuals serving.
