PRESIDENT'S COLUMN

Since this is my first column as President, after taking office at the Annual Meeting in San Diego this past May, I want begin by thanking all those who supported my election, and by greeting the membership at large with my promise to do everything I can to improve the well being of our organization.

AGLP is faced with two pressing issues: a severe financial crunch, and steep decline in membership. During my year as President-Elect, I have considered how best to tackle these problems, and have realized that they need to be dealt with together. The decline in membership has led to a decrease in operating revenues, and the ensuing budgetary restrictions have limited our scope of action, rendering AGLP less visible, and consequently less likely to attract new members. It's a vicious circle, which I don't believe can be broken by attempting to reduce expenditures by cutting back on our organizational activities. To do so would be to become less visible and less present—hardly the way to grow.

Since AGLP cannot rely solely on membership dues for its financial survival, the key is fundraising. Non-profit organizations typically solicit funds from member donations, contributions from members of the Board, gifts from charitable organizations and foundations, bequests of well-meaning individuals, and fundraising events. Up to now, we have followed the philosophy that our events should be revenue neutral. I feel, however, that for AGLP to thrive, each of our events should have the potential to produce income, even if that does not always happen.

internist who was a successful businessman before becoming a physician, and to collaborate with other motivated members and Board officers such as Kenn Ashley. I am confident that the Development Committee will make a major contribution toward solidifying AGLP's financial stability in the near future.

The second issue—membership decline—raises both philosophical and practical questions. We need to ask ourselves what we are actually offering as an organization to our current and prospective membership. In addition, we need next to ask how to go about developing a grass-root campaign to increase membership. During the first of our newly instituted monthly telephone Executive Board meetings, it was proposed to divide the national territory into areas—focusing initially on metropolitan areas—and to recruit voluntary local motivators to organize fundraising events targeted to attract prospective members. Specifically how to implement this approach remains an open issue, still requiring additional development, but our hope is that it will prove a fruitful alternative to the traditional Membership Committee. The last few Membership Committees, despite earnest efforts on the part of their Chairs, have been unsuccessful in reversing the current trend of membership loss. Whatever approach we take, particular emphasis must be given to recruiting students and residents.

My previous involvement with local and national organizations such as GLPNY (Gay and Lesbian Psychiatrists of New York) has made me aware of the tendency to fall into a deceptive sense of security and safety. It is easy for gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgendered individuals to feel that we are now socially protected, and relatively immune to the attacks of which we were targets during the last century. Consequently, the need can feel less pressing to belong to an organization that advocates to safeguard our rights, and fights to protect us from being abused and discriminated against as a minority. A glance at any newspaper should remind us that the ground we have gained could be lost at any time in our volatile religious, social, and political milieu.

GLP has historically fought hard to protect civil liberties for our community, such as non-discrimination policies in the workplace, legal status for LGBT families, equality with heterosexuals in legal and financial issues, and, above all, the protection of the mental health of LGBT individuals, by, for example, educating the mental health community and society at large about the nefarious effects of "reparative" therapy. To continue this work, the key is communication—it's the prime reason we bond together as a group...

My strategy for resolving the financial crisis, therefore, is simple: let's develop our fundraising capability by potentiating the Development Committee. The importance of this committee, which was originally headed by the late Rick Hire, is highlighted by the fact that its Chair is a voting member of the Executive Board. The Development Committee will oversee all aspects of fundraising, including development of a consistent and ongoing grant application process, collaboration with the Vice-President and the Executive Director in organizing events, consultation with the Treasurer, and co-ordination of its efforts with new membership recruitment organisms.

We are fortunate that Stephen Carlson has accepted to chair the Development Committee. Stephen has started already to recruit for his committee capable and willing individuals, such as Robert Lopatin, an AGLP has historically fought hard to protect civil liberties for our community, such as non-discrimination policies in the workplace, legal status for LGBT families, equality with heterosexuals in legal and financial issues, and, above all, the protection of the mental health of LGBT individuals, by, for example, educating the mental health community and society at large about the nefarious effects of "reparative" therapy. To continue this work, the key is communication—it's the prime reason we bond together as a group: to communicate effectively with each other, and with others outside our group. My goal is to enhance communication among the AGLP membership, within the AGLP board, and with society at large. During my tenure, I promise that I will make every effort to make us all proud to belong to AGLP.



PSYCHOANALYTIC COMMITTEE: PROPOSAL FOR A CHANGE IN NAME AND DIRECTION

As the new chair of the AGLP's Psychoanalytic Committee, I wish to propose a change in name and purpose for the committee. As I understand it, the Psychoanalytic Committee was formed to advocate for our members who were facing discrimination in their psychoanalytic training as openly LGBT candidates. Some of you may be surprised to hear that while the American Psychiatric Association removed homosexuality from the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual in 1973, many psychoanalytic institutes continued

to consider homosexuality a disorder, and a reason for excluding a person from psychoanalytic training, until the 1990s.

Nowadays, psychoanalytic institutes are more accepting of gay and lesbian people, and therefore there may not be as great a need for this kind of advocacy. I, for example, applied to the Toronto Institute for Contemporary Psychoanalysis as an openly gay man and was welcomed, as was a fellow first-year candidate. What, then, might be the role of the AGLP's Psychoanalytic Committee?

I propose that the mandate of the committee shift from an advocacy role to an educational role, providing a forum at the AGLP Annual Meeting for members who would like to discuss their experiences in providing psychodynamic psychotherapy and the experience of being an LGBT therapist. I suggest that the name of the Committee be changed to the Psychodynamic Psychotherapy committee to reflect the broader interest of our members. What are your thoughts about this? I spoke to some members after our last committee meeting at the AGLP Meeting in San Diego who wondered whether it might more straightforwardly be called the Psychotherapy Committee to be even more inclusive.

Do you have an opinion about this? I want to hear from members about what direction they might like this committee to take. I think there is great potential for the committee as our members have been at the forefront of the field of LGBT-oriented psychotherapy, and our organization publishes the premiere journal on this topic: The Journal of Gay and Lesbian Psychotherapy.

Collectively, the expertise and experience of our membership represent tremendous education resource. Is there not a way we could take advantage of this? I would expect that many people are in the position of trying to learn how to do psychotherapy with LGBT people in a part of the world where appropriate supervision is non-existent. With the kind of distance education technology available these days, is there not a way we could offer those people supervision resources of one form or another. Could this be a revenue- and/or member-ship-generating opportunity?

CONVENTION REPORT AGLP SAN DIEGO 2007

In September of 2006, the AGLP Executive Board and Council voted to further trim the Annual Meeting expenses after a more substantial cut in 2005. A revised budget was formulated allotting a total expense amount of \$26,850.00 (reduced by 1% from 2005). Actual convention expenses for the AGLP 2007 Annual Meeting in Toronto totaled \$31,616.21, \$4,766.21 or 18% over the budgeted amount. These expenses were offset by gifts and grants in the amount of \$1,500.00, Symposium registration fees in the amount of \$850.00, and Closing Banquet ticket sales in the amount of \$6,670.00, for a net cost to AGLP of \$22,596.21. This compares to a net cost for the Toronto Meeting (2006) of \$20,607.34. The \$1,500.00 grant, mentioned above, was received from Forest Pharmaceuticals to offset expenses associated with the Symposium. As was the case last year, no other grant funding was secured by Local Arrangements or AGLP Board Members.

The bulk of the overrun is attributed to the AGLP Symposium "Substance Use Disorders in the Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgendered Populations", running about 154% of budget. Twenty-four people were in attendance at the AGLP Symposium, with 15 requesting CME Credits supplied by the California Society for Addition Medicine. Costs associated with this symposium totaled \$6,943.43 (\$289.31/person). Expenses were related to food and beverage, Audio-Visual fees, Syllabus printing, and Speaker travel expense reimbursement. The APA provided the meeting room to us free of charge. Registration fees in the amount of \$850.00 were applied to these expenses.

The Opening reception at the Hilton Gaslamp, was extremely popular and successful, and came within our budget goals. The Closing Banquet, the singlemost expensive component of the Annual Meeting, totaled \$8,527.69 in expenses, about 6% over budget. This was offset by \$7520.00 in ticket sales — coming within \$1,007.69 of our goal of a revenue-neutral event.

The costs associated with Printed Materials, Shipping, and Miscellaneous were all within budget guidelines. The AGLP booth expenses ran \$206.25 over budget (7.9% over budget), due mainly to the elevated cost of furniture rental in San Diego.

Receptions hosted by Jonathan Koelle, Richard Shapiro, and Ken Campos, were extremely popular and well attended. Jon and Ken contributed greatly to the costs of these events with some support from AGLP in the amount of \$500.00 (not funded as of the date of this report).

This year, the APA did not under right the cost of our Hospitality Suite or our Membership Meeting space. This made for an unexpected cost of just over \$4,000.00. The Sunday Board Meeting and the Opening Reception spaces were provided free-of-charge by APA. Overall the AGLP Host Hotel (the Omni) served us well and there were general good reviews of our time there. AGLP Hospitality Suite use/programming totaled a record-low of 13.25 hours over the span of 3 days (46% occupancy). Attendance at Hospitality Suite events was light.

No guide to San Diego was produced this year and our Printed Materials item was under budget. Other Miscellaneous expenses include badges and other general meeting materials/supplies. Other commodities generally associated with the Annual Meeting in past years were either eliminated or kept to a bare minimum.

AGLP BOARD AND ADVISORY COUNCIL MEETING AGLP ANNUAL MEETING

Sunday, May 20 8:30am-12:00pm Omni Hotel; San Diego, CA

The meeting was called to order at 8:45am by Dr. Dan Karasic.

Minutes from the 2006 Board and Advisory Council Meeting were reviewed and approved.

2007 Symposium: Kenn Ashley, M.D.

This year's symposium on Substance Use Disorders in LGBT Populations, while well received, was poorly attended. Due to the high cost of the symposium, as well as the historically poor attendance over the last couple of years, the possibility of incorporating the symposium into the APA calendar via co-sponsorship, was discussed as a cost containment measure, as well as a way of improving attendance. One of the major drawbacks to incorporation of the symposium into the APA schedule would be loss of control over the time and date of the symposium, as well as the need for approval of content by the Scientific Affairs Committee of the APA. The APA will typically cover all expenses for sponsored courses and symposia, including CME, significantly limiting the expense to AGLP. A similar framework was used successfully at the Institute for Psychiatric Services meeting last year. Various board members will follow-up regarding this process and report back at the Fall Business Meeting. Incorporation of the symposium would also mean that the timeline for content planning would be much tighter and all facets of planning would need to be completed by August of the year prior to the Annual Meeting.

Treasurer's Report/Budget: Petros Levounis, M.D.

Executive Director's Report: Roy Harker

AGLP continues to experience a decline in membership, which is adversely affecting the financial health of the organization. Some discussion centered on the role of the new membership renewal system in reducing membership given some technical challenges. Mr. Harker will continue to work to refine this system. The organization is on target to complete 2007 with a budget surplus of \$2000; however, cash flow remains a significant problem given the Annual Meeting expenses. Mr. Harker and Dr. Levounis stressed the importance of seeking grants outside of the pharmaceutical industry, and emphasized the importance of financial development for all Board and Advisory Council members. Of note, the Annual Meeting (with the exception of the Symposium) will come in on budget targets. The group also discussed the possibility of endowing certain AGLP awards, rather than listing them as budget items from year to year.

Mr. Harker discussed the proposed budget for FY2008, presenting two different alternatives. After some minor adjustments and discussion from the Board, the FY2008 budget was approved with anticipated receipts of \$92,900 and anticipated expenses of \$90,900. Details of the budget are available from the national office.

Three weeks prior to the Board and Advisory Council meeting, the final bequest from the Rundle estate was given to AGLP, totaling approximately \$26,000. Most of this bequest was used to complete the funding for the Fryer Award. An additional \$6300 remains in reserve to be used at the Board's discretion. Unanimous approval was given to use these monies for operational expenses. The film project continues to generate revenue for AGLP, with current royalties at \$1500.

Committee development remains an important priority of the Board. Mr. Harker also stressed the importance of email communications with members.

Newsletter: George Harrison, M.D.

Dr. Harrison and Roy Harker reported that 30% of members continue to receive the printed copy of the newsletter. For financial reasons, receipt of the email format of the newsletter should continue to be encouraged for all members. Paper copies will remain available for promotional purposes. The Board and Advisory Council also engaged in brainstorming about how to differentiate member from non-member content in the newsletter in order to increase the value of AGLP membership vis-à-vis the newsletter specifically.

Development Committee

This position is currently vacant, and a new chair is being actively recruited.

Film Project: David Scasta, M.D.

This committee report was held in Executive Session.

Fryer Award Committee

The composition of this group is changing, with Dr. Leli replacing Phil Bialer, M.D.. Upcoming Fryer Awards will be given at the IPS in Chicago in October 2008 and at the APA in San Francisco in May 2009.

International Committee: Gene Nakajima, M.D.

Dr. Nakajima continues to be very active in creating a presence for LGB issues at the international level and discussed numerous upcoming international psychiatric meetings. He is also planning an AGLP historical exhibit for the APA in San Francisco in 2009 and is actively seeking archival materials, funding and a curator for the exhibit. He also would like for this exhibit to travel to medical schools for informational and promotional purposes.

Journal of Gay and Lesbian Psychotherapy: Jack Drescher, M.D.

Dr. Drescher reported that the next several issues of the journal have been planned, and include such topics as LGB Activism and Health; Childhood Gender Non-Conformity and Sexual Orientation (the first issue guest-edited by a transgendered person); Psychoanalysis and Homosexuality; and Orthodox Jewish Culture and Homosexuality. The journal will also be eligible for reapplication for Medline in the next couple of years. Drs. Howard Rubin and Mary Barber will be assuming editorship of the journal in the near future.

Membership Committee

This position is currently vacant, and a new chair is being actively recruited. Dr. Leli reported that his plan when he assumes the presidency is to make membership recruitment a more localized process. More details to follow.

Psychoanalytic Committee: Ubaldo Leli, M.D.

Dr. Chris McIntosh will assume the chair of this committee as Dr. Leli is now the President-Elect. Dr. Leli stressed the need for ongoing education about the role of homosexuality in psychoanalysis, noting that conflicts with psychoanalysis are much less now than in the past. He continues to work actively with Chinese analysts.

Medical Students Section: Marc Manseau

Mr. Manseau introduced himself as the new chair for this section, noting the importance of recruitment and retention of medical student members. He described his efforts in cementing a relationship with the American Medical Student Association by submitting information to their list serves as well as having a presence at their meetings. He also emphasized the importance of medical student recruitment through programming at the Annual Meeting, as well as strengthening the AGLP mentorship program.

Members-in Training Section: Karl Jeffries, M.D.

Dr. Jeffries introduced himself as the new chair for this section, providing a brief personal history of his roles as a high school teacher and in activism. During medical school, he developed a sexuality curriculum, focusing on LGBT issues. He also discussed the importance of working with the Group for the Advancement of Psychotherapy in its ongoing project to develop an LGB curriculum. This curriculum is in the final stages of approval and will be made public soon as a tool for residency education. Dr. Jeffries also stressed the importance of general outreach in increasing the residency contingent in AGLP.

AGLP Representative to the APA Assembly for Allied Organizations: David Scasta, M.D.

Dr. Scasta is one of AGLP's representatives to the APA Assembly and represents AGLP as an allied organization of the APA. Dr. Scasta has donated his travel expenses for APA Assembly Meetings to AGLP and the Board and Advisory Council thanked him for his ongoing support of the organization. This position will continue to be a Board-appointed one; however, the term has not yet been decided. More discussion will follow at the Fall Business Meeting.

Dr. Scasta stressed that in order to maintain our Allied Organization status (and retain the extra Assembly seat), AGLP must maintain a membership that is at least 80% psychiatrists. Additionally, 70% of the AGLP membership must be APA members. Dr. Scasta also described the importance of communication from the AGLP Board and other members re: the issues that he should submit to the Assembly in his role.

Lesbian, Gay and Bisexual APA Caucus Report

This report was provided at the general membership meeting.

Lesbian, Gay and Bisexual Committee of the APA: Serena Volpp, M.D., Chair

Dr. Volpp discussed numerous initiatives of the LGB Committee. The Committee is coordinating many different types of programming at the APA, including a special presentation on MSM in the African-American community. Dr. Volpp stressed the importance of LGB representation among the minority fellowships available through the APA. Additionally, the group is sponsoring an LGB fellowship, funded through the American Psychiatric Foundation/Gill Foundation. Other initiatives include ongoing work to redefine gender identity disorder in the DSM-V and creating an "instruction manual" for gays in the military. The Committee is also urging the APA to revise its statement on conversion therapies and noted that an Ex-Gay Survivors Conference will be held at the same time as the Exodus Conference at the end of June 2007.

The meeting was adjourned at 12:30pm by Dr. Karasic.

AGLP ANNUAL BUSINESS MEETING

Sunday, May 20, 2007

Dr. Dan Karasic, President of AGLP, called the meeting to order at 2:00pm.

The minutes for the 2006 AGLP Annual Business Meeting were reviewed and approved.

A special thank you was extended to the Local Arrangements Committee for their hard work in planning the 2007 AGLP Annual Meeting and Symposium.

AGLP Annual Symposium: Kenn Ashley, M.D.

This annual event is one of the most important educational events during the AGLP Annual Meeting. The idea of co-sponsorship with the APA for this event was discussed (please refer to the Board and Advisory Council meeting minutes for full details). Dr. Ashley also reported on the various programming elements available at the Hospitality Suite.

Budget: Roy Harker

The FY2008 budget was approved by the Board at today's meeting. Anticipated receipts for 2008 will be \$92,900 and anticipated expenses will be \$90,900. Mr. Harker stressed the singular importance of reduction in membership as a driver for our current financial problems. He encouraged everyone to pay their 2008 dues as soon as possible in order to help with an anticipated \$2000 cash flow deficit in the coming weeks. He also reported that the Rundle bequest of \$26,000 will be used, in part, to fund the Fryer Award.

Newsletter Editor: George Harrison, M.D.

Dr. Harrison thanked Roy Harker for his ongoing work in creating the newsletter as a particular value of AGLP membership. Expenses for this item are now approaching 10% of the AGLP budget and may be a particular focus for cost savings.

Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual Caucus of the APA Report: Mark Townsend, M.D. and Phil Bialer, M.D.

The LGB caucus is one of eight caucuses of the APA, all of which have a representative on the APA Assembly. Caucuses were originally established to function as advocacy groups and to help represent minorities in the APA Assembly. The LGB caucus currently contains 175 members. Dr. Townsend encouraged all AGLP members to join the LGB caucus by going to the Members Corner area of the APA website, noting that each individual can only be a member of one caucus.

The upcoming president of the APA, Dr. Nada Stotland, is very interested in LGB representation on various APA components, and any interested individuals should discuss with Dr. Townsend or Dr. Bialer. Programming is also an important function of the caucus, and is performed through the Office of Minority and National Affairs and the Minority and Under-Represented Committee of the APA, of which the LGB Caucus is a part.

Historically, the LGB Caucus representative was AGLP's only presence at the APA Assembly; however, since AGLP has been granted Allied Organization status through the APA, an additional seat is now available (Dr. Scasta is currently in this position).

Dr. Townsend encouraged the Board to consider a Bylaws change so that the president of AGLP is no longer the de-facto president of the LGB Caucus, but that instead, that presidency of the caucus be assigned to the LGB Caucus Representative.

AGLP Representative to the APA Assembly for Allied Organizations: David Scasta, M.D.

AGLP is one of eighteen Allied Organizations of the APA, and Dr. Scasta represents AGLP in that capacity at the APA Assembly. Dr. Scasta described the importance of communication from AGLP members re: the issues that he should submit to the Assembly in his role. He also stated that no action papers relevant to LGB issues were discussed at the last Assembly meeting. Of note, Dr. Scasta donates all of his travel expenses for Assembly meetings and was thanked by the Board for his ongoing support of the organization.

Development Committee

The chair for this committee is currently vacant, and active recruitment by the Board is underway for this important position.

Film Project: David Scasta, M.D.

The AGLP film project continues to prosper and the film is currently on sale through Amazon. Com and the AGLP website. The film has been accepted to the Philadelphia Gay and Lesbian Film Festival and the Toronto Film Festival, with other applications for film festivals pending.

Fryer Award Committee

Upcoming Fryer Awards will be given at the IPS in Chicago in October 2008 and at the APA in San Francisco in May 2009.

Membership: Roy Harker and Board/Advisory Council

The Membership Committee chair remains vacant, and anyone who is interested in serving in this position should notify any Board member. While a single national chair is needed, the Board will be moving towards a more localized process in the future.

Overall membership has decreased by 21% in the last two years, and by 35% in the last 9 years. Mr. Harker encouraged active participation by all members in recruitment and retention. The Board also discussed the importance of adding value to AGLP membership, and in particular, using the internet to do so. Of note, membership is now on a rolling-year basis. Automatic membership renewals are not possible due to security reasons.

International Committee: Gene Nakajima, M.D.

Dr. Nakajima continues to be very active in creating a presence for LGB issues at the international level and discussed numerous upcoming international psychiatric meetings. He is also planning an AGLP historical exhibit for the APA in San Francisco in 2009 and is actively seeking archival materials, funding and a curator for the exhibit. He also would like for this exhibit to travel to medical schools for informational and promotional purposes.

Psychoanalytic Committee: Ubaldo Leli, M.D.

Dr. Chris McIntosh will assume the chair of this committee as Dr. Leli is now the President-Elect. Dr. Leli stressed the need for ongoing education about the role of homosexuality in psychoanalysis, noting that the workshop on shame in treatment remains an important part of the educational programming through the Hospitality Suite at the AGLP Annual Meeting.

Medical Students Section: Marc Manseau

Mr. Manseau introduced himself as the new chair for this section, noting the importance of recruitment and retention of medical student members. His particular goals for the coming year include cementing alliances between AGLP and the

American Medical Student Association as well as strengthening the AGLP mentorship program for medical students.

Members-in Training Section: Karl Jeffries, M.D.

Dr. Jeffries introduced himself as the new chair for this section. Dr. Jeffries stressed the importance of general outreach in increasing the residency contingent in AGLP, and reminded the AGLP membership of the residency reception during the Annual Meeting.

Lambda Legal Amicus Brief: Dan Karasic, M.D.

Dr. Karasic discussed an amicus brief titled "Suggestions for Mental Health Professionals Representing the Transgendered Community to the Press." This brief was generated by Lambda Legal, who has requested AGLP co-sponsorship. Two Board and Advisory Council members are working on some improvements in the language of the brief and will discuss at a later date.

The meeting was adjourned at 3:15pm by Dr. Karasic.



THE 2007 RALPH ROUGHTON PAPER AWARD

In honor of the founding Chairperson of the Committee on Gay and Lesbian Issues, the Ralph Roughton Paper Award was established in 1998 to give formal recognition for outstanding contributions to the psychoanalytic understanding of gay men and lesbians, and was expanded in 2007 to include bisexual and transgender issues. Paper submissions are welcome from anyone regardless of institutional affiliation.

Entries must be submitted electronically no later than September 30, 2007.

I am pleased to announce a special interview that I did with Alfred M. Freedman 102nd President of the APA who is 90 years old this year.

Dr. Freedman discusses the circumstances which brought him to be a successful petition candidate for the presidency of the American Psychiatric Association in 1972. He tells the behind the scene story of how during his presidency the Board of Trustees and the Assembly voted to remove homosexuality from the Diagnostic Statistical Manual (DSM) declaring that it was not a mental disorder.

Dr. Freedman also discusses the connection between Watergate and the break in to the office of psychiatrist Daniel Ellsburg and how that led to a response by the APA concerning confidentiality which has repercussions today.
